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semi-circle of easels, molten with paint, nem's studio is a cathedral to his passion, housed in their own spacious glass sanctuary within the studio. Hunt Slonem's studio is a beehive of activity, and he, the beating heart at its center. His prodigious creative flow is otherworldly. Slonem's paintings make a clarion statement; one where joy, radiance, and spiritual connection take physical form.

Slonem's paintings are leaving an indelible mark moment when he was surrounded by butterflies; on the contemporary art world, his distinct style and subject matter are as iconic as they are inspired. His signature use of bold colors and varied textures as he revisits his core subjects keeps his work current yet classic. The nature of an icon is the ability to be recalled, recognized the expression that becomes the artist's fingerprint of sorts; Hunt Slonem is definitely an icon.

Hunt Slonem embodies just what a faithful messenger should be: Loud and clear. Playful, joyous, even childlike on the surface, these paintings are warm and welcoming. They charm and disarm; the familiarity of Slonem's subjects draws us in, evoking our curiosity, even our skepticism. However, when we look closely and consider why he chooses these an-

in the glorious natural light; Hunt Slo- Slonem has spoken in depth about what he paints, and why he paints them again and again. He is most full of life and color. The quiet is pierced only by the famous for his paintings of bunnies, birds, and butoccasional sharp call out from his flock of rare birds terflies; these subjects are part of a deeper story of Slonem's inspiration as an artist and his spiritual calling to paint. The rabbit is a timeless symbol of purity, innocence, and vulnerability. The bird represents freedom and hope, and the butterfly, of course, symbolizes transformation and rebirth. During his time studying abroad in tropical climates such as Mexico and Nicaragua, he recalls a single

Such symbols are so familiar to us that we take for granted their powerful message. Often, the most profound ideas are the simplest. Slonem's paintings aren't "think" pieces, they are reminders. The clarity of his message is reflected in the directness of his paintings, his compositions, the choices he makes as an artist; there is no double meaning, only clear, bare-faced truth.

In Slonem's larger works, the populated space of his paintings is both maximalist and minimalist. His repetition of a bird, a bunny, a butterfly, a leaf, or a

flower across the canvas, transcends itself and becomes a pattern. Filling a can-

vas with the same subject in this repetitious way is like a mantra

- quieting the senses, surrounding the viewer with flora and fauna in a way that seeks to remind us of the powerful influence of natural beauty, and its message to one's soul: "Tune in and notice me!" This approach to his subjects, combined with his processes of handling the

paint, such as cross-hatching, surface

layering, scoring, and wet on wet painting, result in mesmerizing compositions that are both aesthetically pleasing and critically engaging.

This explains why many collectors of Slonem's paintings often come back for more after buying just one small bunny, and why demand for his work remains strong after over 40 years of showing. His paintings, while they appear simple in subject, are charged with

the artist' joy, love, and pure fascination. Slonem's canvases infuse a room with this positive energy.

A kaleidoscope of butterflies, perhaps one of the most delicate yet essential beings in our ecosystem, delivered the enduring inspiration to Slonem's

life mission: to create paintings that con-

nect us to nature. In any other era, this may seem sweet or quaint,

but in our time, with nature under siege, habitats disappearing, and mass extinctions imminent. ഴ്ച Slonem's life work has become a timely badge of respect for our natural world. BIOGRAPHY

Inspired by nature and his many pet birds, Hunt Slonem is renowned for his distinct neo-expressionist style. He is best known for his series of bunnies, butterflies, and tropical birds, as well as his large-scale sculptures and restorations of forgotten historic homes. Slonem's works can be found in the permanent collections of 350 museums around the world, including the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City, the Whitney, the Miro Foundation, and the New Orleans Museum of Art.

Since his first solo show at the Fischbach Gallery in 1977, Slonem's work has been showcased hundreds of times, most recently at the Albany Institute of History & Art (2024), Louisiana State Museum (2024), Vienna Kunstforum Museum (2023), The Art Museum Riga Bourse in Rida, Latvia (2022), The Siauliai Ausros Museum in Lithuania (2022), and The Osthaus Museum in Hagen, Germany, (2022). Slonem is also in countless galleries throughout the world.

His flair and admiration for far-flung destinations has been a staple of his life since childhood. Slonem was born in 1951 in Kittery, Maine, and his father's position as a Navy officer meant the family moved often during Hunt's formative years, including extended stays in Hawaii, California, and Connecticut. He would continue to seek out travel opportunities throughout his youngadult years, studying abroad in Nicaragua and Mexico; these eye-opening experiences imbued him with an appreciation for tropical landscapes that would influence his unique style.

After graduating with a degree in painting and art history from Tulane University in New Orleans, Slonem spent several years in the early 1970s living in Manhattan. It wasn't until Janet Fish offered him her studio for the summer of 1975 that Slonem was able to fully immerse himself in his work. His pieces began getting exhibited around New York, propelling his reputation and thrusting him into the city's explosive contemporary arts scene. He received several prestigious grants, including from Montre-

al's Elizabeth Greenshields Foundation, the National Endowment for the Arts, and the Cultural Counsel Foundation's Artist Project, for which he painted an 80-foot mural of the World Trade Center in the late 1970s. He also received an introduction to the Marlborough Gallery, which would represent him for 18 years.

As Slonem honed his aesthetic, his work began appearing in unique, contextual spaces. By 1995 he finished a massive sixby-86-foot mural of birds, which shoots across the walls of the Bryant Park Grill Restaurant in New York City. His charity work has resulted in dozens of partnerships, including a wallpaper of his famous bunnies designed specifically with Lee Jofa for the Ronald McDonald House in Long Island. His fabrics and wallpapers can be sourced only by designers at Kravet.

Slonem continues to draw great inspiration from history, forging palpable connections to the past through his art. His popular portraits of Abraham Lincoln reframe the historic figure as a pop-art icon, and he is currently working on a ninefoot-tall bronze sculpture of French explorer Robert De La Salle, to be displayed publicly in Louisiana. Yet Slonem's most ambitious project has been his mission to save America's often forgotten historic buildings. Realizing too many of the country's architectural gems have fallen into disrepair, Slonem has found himself drawn to these national landmarks, inspired by the depth of their age and old-world beauty.

Among his accomplishments are the restorations of Cordt's Mansion in Kingston, New York; the Lakeside, Madewell and Albania mansions of Louisiana; and the Scranton Armory and Charles Sumner Woolworth's mansion in Scranton, Pennsylvania, and Belle Terre, South Kortright, New York. His seventh and latest endeavor is Searles Castle in Great Barrington, Massachusetts.
